Vanguard Initiative is a network of regions that looks to support industrial innovation and to build European value-chains based on complementarities in regional smart specialisation strategies. In the core of the Vanguard activities are the eight thematic pilots, which create concrete opportunities for interregional collaboration. During this session we will hear how the network and its activities are organised and how the pilots operate.

The Bio-economy pilot started its activities in 2014 and looks to foster the development of new industrial applications and high added-value bio-based products that surpass conventional uses in food, feed, and fiber. Over the years, more than 20 European regions have been involved in the pilot activities and today the pilot has 16 participating Vanguard Initiative members. During this session, we will hear an overview of the pilot, its objectives and activities so far.

Bio-economy as a part of East and North Finland RIS3 strategy

East and North Finland is a member of the Vanguard Initiative network since 2020 and the Vanguard Initiative Board since 2023. The region joined the Bio-economy pilot in 2024. East and North Finland is a NUTS 2 level region that consists of seven NUTS 3 level regions (South Savo, North Savo, North Karelia, Kainuu, Central Ostrobothnia, Northern Ostrobothnia, Lapland) and has a joint smart specialisation strategy that brings all the mentioned regions together. In this session we will hear about the S3 priorities of East and North Finland, especially from the bio-economy topics perspective.

11.30-12.30 Bio-economy pilot: Looking forward

This session has two parts. It will start with a short panel followed by an open and inclusive discussion on possible new demo cases and topics the pilot could concentrate on. The panellists will set the frame for the discussion, where one perspective is what East and North Finland could offer and propose as topics for future collaboration. The session will especially touch on the following questions: 1) how to include regional expertise in existing demo cases and 2) how to create new demo cases starting from partnerships or demo-existing facilities. The panellists will come from the Bio-economy pilot's current demo cases and East and North Finland.

The Bio-economy pilot currently has four demo cases that concentrate, for example, on the conversion of lignin and forestry and agro-food biomasses into high-added-value biobased products, such as bioaromatics, bioasphalt, bioenergies, and biopolymers. The pilot is open to new ideas, partnerships, demo cases, and perspectives that could bring added value to the regions and stakeholders.

What to see?

Kajaani hosts the ruins of the world's northernmost stone castle. When Finland was still part of Sweden, people who were seen as enemies of the crown were sent to Kajaani castle to serve their time as prisoners. During the Great Northern War in the beginning of the 18th century the Russian army blew the castle up. What remains today are the ruins of once a mighty castle that sits on the shores of the river Kajaani.

Kajaani can be considered as the home town of two men that have deeply marked Finland's history: Elias Lönnrot and Urho Kekkonen. Finland owes its national epic, Kalevala, to Elias Lönnrot. He travelled especially around Karelia during the first part of the 19th century collecting folk tales from rural people and using the oral folklore and mythology in his work. Lönnrot's work and memory is cherished by the Elias Lönnrot centre located at the small and charming Kajaani town hall. The town hall was designed by the German architect Carl Ludvig Engel, who also helped to rebuild the monumental centre of the country's capital, Helsinki.

Urho Kekkonen was the president of Finland from 1956 to 1982, making him by far the most longstanding president in the history of the country. Kekkonen spent a big part of his childhood and his youth in Kajaani, where his home building still stands at Kalliokatu 7.

The most recent highlight in Kajaani is the [EuroHPC supercomputer LUMI](#), which is the fastest in Europe and the fifth fastest supercomputer in the world.



Where to stay?

Accommodation for participants is arranged at [Hotel Kajanus](#) of the Peera group. The fixed price for a single room from the 24th to the 26th of September (Standard Room) is 105 € per night. Did you know?

If Kajaani seems a rather distant place even on the Finnish scale, it is actually located very close to the country's continental geographic center. The center point can be found in Puolanka – a municipality that has branded itself as the most pessimistic place in Finland. Tourism in the region of Kainuu is strongly connected to nature with for example a lot of hiking opportunities. This is not surprising given the vast forest areas in the region. Nature and wild life tours are one of the main tourist attractions of the region with bear safaris being the highlight.

When you visit Kajaani you definitely cannot leave without trying the best rye bread in the country. Rye bread is a sourdough bread that has a solid place in the Finnish kitchen. Currently, rye bread enjoys the status of a national food and Finns even celebrate rye bread day yearly in the end of February. The arguably best rye bread in Finland can be bought in the Kajaani city center.

What is East and North Finland?

East and North Finland is a NUTS 2 level region that consists of seven NUTS 3 level regions (South Savo, North Savo, North Karelia, Kainuu, Central Ostrobothnia, Northern Ostrobothnia, Lapland). Geographically East and North Finland covers over two thirds of the country, but on the other hand it is a region with a sparse population and long distances. The interregional conference host city Kajaani is located in the Kainuu region.

The regions of East and North Finland have a longstanding history of collaboration and have together produced a joint smart specialisation strategy for East and North Finland. This strategy brings the seven regions together and forms the basis for East and North Finland's membership in the Vanguard Initiative network. The joint S3 is available [here](#).
